CURRENT EVENTS - UGANDA

The United States was not the only country who faced a controversial presidential election. The president of Uganda, Yoweri Museveni, was announced the winner of the presidency for a sixth term on Saturday, January 16th. The results arrived amidst claims of election fraud by his opponent, Bob Wine, and months of protests by civilians that have led to heavy security measures, arrests, and even deaths. While Museveni insisted that the election was honest and that all problems were rectified, doubts have arisen due to the exclusion of international observers and an internet shutdown that lasted until two days after election. the retreat of police the After surrounding his home (stationed there to prevent further protests), Wine and his legal team have filed a Supreme Court Lawsuit against Museveni. He has also filed a complaint at the local office of the United Nations, where journalists covering the motion were attacked and beaten by Ugandan military police. These events, along with a list of 243 people that Wine claims have been abducted by state agents, have raised concerns from both the United States and the European Union.

DID YOU KNOW?

English Language Learners can receive two types of service from their ESOL teacher. All ELLs receive integrated ENL service. This means that the ESOL teacher and the classroom or content teacher work together to plan and the ESOL teacher provides scaffolds or modifications so that the student is working toward grade level or content goals. This usually happens in the classroom, in a co-teaching model, but doesn't necessarily have to. ELLs at the Entering and Emerging levels will also receive stand-alone service. This means that the ESOL teacher plans lessons to meet the language goals for that individual student or small group of students. This usually happens in a pull-out model, in the ENL classroom, but doesn't necessarily have to. The difference between the two types of service is really about the goals for students. ELLs need to be working toward content and grade level goals while also building their proficiency in English. ESOL teachers are experts at planning for both types of goals.
